

- Economic development: contributing to sustainable economic growth, market development and the creation of decent jobs
- Environment: addressing climate change and its effects and managing natural resources sustainably
- Human development: saving lives, ensuring quality basic services, especially in relation to education and healthcare, and reducing the causes of forced displacement and irregular migration
- Peacebuilding and governance: promoting peace, the rule of law and gender equality



# Economic Development > decent jobs






Inclusive quality education translates into higher earnings, greater productivity, sustainable and inclusive economic growth and lays the foundations for decent work.






# Environmentclimate change

Protecting and ensuring basic human rights, enhancing social integration and providing equal prospects are the reasons why **education and health** as essential basic services are a the centre in order to leave no one behind — including during emergencies and protracted crises.

# Example: Ensuring children can complete a basic education in fragile contexts or in emergencies/crises

## Quality Education for All - Leave no one behind

Address complex and varied reasons for lack of access or exclusion from quality education for different groups and individuals and across their lifespan.

#### Focus on specific groups:

- remote areas, rural communities
- girls/ women
- people with disabilities
- indigenous groups, national minorities
- early childhood education
- ...

#### Focus on specific approaches:

- inclusive education
- intercultural education
- peace education
- multilingual education, mother tongue-based multilingual education
- Continuum of education
- ...

- Systemic approach to TTQE
- Competencies of teachers to provide quality education

#### **Education in Emergencies**

- Exchange of experience thematic day 2017
- Workshop on psychosocial support


